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A "new" start

After a temporary halt due to the Covid pandemic, the SPEME group resumed in situ activities, following the true nature of the project, which is precisely to foster exchange between academic researchers engaged in the study d of memory, trauma and heritage.

In this third Bulletin we present and share the most relevant activities carried out from May 2022 to April 2023.

On site activities from May 2022 to April 2023 between Europe and Latin America

Amsterdam, May 2022

Amsterdam was the host city for the first post-covid presence activities of the SPEME project. In the Dutch capital, the project partners resumed fieldwork at traumatic memory sites and museums (e.g. Kamp Amersfort, Kamp Vught) and discussed new strategies for transmitting the traumatic past through art and creativity. Among the main activities of the Dutch period, it is important to mention the on site exhibition "Objects and Stories" curated by prof. Ihab Saloul and his students from the UvA. Moreover we would like to mention the lectures by Camilo Forero (UNAL), entitled "The essentialism of the victim: dehumanising people" and that of Lorena Villate (Bogotá), entitled "Narratives of female exile as an act of political resistance: the Colombian case". Moreover, the group also visited the 'Revolusi' exhibition on the Indonesian revolution at the Rijskmuseum, as well as a visit to the International Institute of Social History to see the materials and collections on Colombia and South America. In addition, the partners had the opportunity to attend a presentation of recent works by Dutch-Indonesian artist Merapi Obermayer, who with her art she works on postcolonial issues, traumatic memory and personal history.

Bologna, June 2022

After the Dutch month, the team met again in Bologna to follow the Italian activities coordinated by the University of Bologna. In addition to fieldwork at sites of fascist and Nazi memory and trauma, the group had the opportunity to participate in a conference "Presences of the Pasts: Semiotic and Digital Approaches to Memory and Heritage", on the relationship between traumatic memories, post-conflict contexts and digital spaces, organised at the Centro Eco in Bologna.

The Italian period was also mainly devoted to the discussion and methodological exchange on the annual workshop: the podcasts organised in the various partner countries. In particular, the partners shared the process that led them to the construction and production of the audio products (a more detailed description of the workshop is on page 10).

Bogotà, September 2022

The SPEME Colombia group organised many activities on the themes of memory and heritage during 2022.

However, here it is particularly useful to mention one of these events because it played a very important role in the transnational dialogue on the specific research topics of the SPEME project: the conference "Congreso Procesos de Memoria en América Latina y el Caribe. Encrucijadas y debates'.

The event was organised by the Colombian ONALME group of SPEME, directed by Neyla Graciela Pardo Abril.

The aim of the project was to create a debate for a transversal reflection on memory processes in Latin America. the Caribbean and Colombia, conferences, dialogues, workshops and visits to famous memory sites such as the National Museum of Colombia, the Bronx Creative District, Fragments and the Cloister of San Agustin, as well as the installation and visit of the exhibition 'Unearth and speak' by artist Juan Manuel Echavarría. The interventions of the authors involved were collected in the audiovisual book 'Reflections on Memory and Peace'. The most relevant presentations were selected for inclusion in the book in print "Procesos de memorias en América Latina y el Caribe".



Buenos Aires. March 2023

The month of March was dedicated to Argentine history and memory, with a particular focus on the forms of complicity and educational strategies adopted by various memorials and museums to transmit difficult and traumatic memories to different types of generations. In addition to site visits and dialogue with numerous educators, curators, museum directors, and activists, there was no shortage of scholarly discussions. In fact, two seminars were held in the first half of the month, one entitled.

'Caught between past and future. A workshop on changing the prospects of memorial systems' - ran by Michael Defuster (H401) and the other 'Imaginary Interviews with the Past' ran by Mario Panico (University of Amsterdam) where there were also present the students who partecipated in the Argentinian workshop.

In the second half of March. the Buenos Aires group (coordinated by Lizel Tornay) organized an international conference entitled 'Arte y memoria,' in which scholars from all over the world discussed the relationship between artistic production and trauma. From a theoretical point of view, The conference was opened by a lecture by Griselda Pollock (professor emeritus, University of Leeds).

March was an important month because all partners began to reflect, from a comparative perspective, on the concept of implicating subject, as proposed by the American memory studies scholar Michel Rothberg. The partners discussed how (and if it is possible) to represent responsibility and complicity in the museums and memorials.

Imaginary Interviews with the past: a SPEME podcast

This year's workshop was an innovative challenge for the speme project partners, who measured themselves against a new tool that is very much in vogue in contemporary media: the podcast. How is it possible to narrate traumatic events without using visual media? What are the methodological choices to be made in order to convey events that we have not experienced but which nevertheless characterise our present?

The workshop focused on the idea of promoting knowledge of one's own country's traumatic past (or, in some cases, present) among adolescents, through a non-unidirectional transmission, based on a process of empowerment of the participants' agency.

Starting from the assumption that much of the literature on traumatic legacies has been (and it is still today) based on the live narratives of witnesses; that it is precisely this practice of listening that is gradually being denied to the new generations, the idea of this project is to produce a sort of imaginary dialogue between boys and girls and those who lived through traumatic events in the past, or who are currently living in conflict situation but are in some way "unreachable".

Usually the voices that are heard are those of the victims, in order to compensate them in some small way for the enforced silence in which they have been immerged. This often prevents us from understanding the processes that involved the perpetrators. Try to know their dynamics of involvement is certainly not useful for a process of redemption, but it can help to understand the way in which violent power concern the subjects. From this perspective, we would also discuss the figure of the "implicated subject", who corresponds neither to the victim nor to the perpetrator, but who is today more relevant than ever for the younger generations.

The first reason is related to the fact that the young people do not have directly experience of traumas, but at the same time they are often implicated, non-participating observers, of everyday microtraumas – consequences of those of the past, of which the adolescents usually feel neither victims nor "guilty".

The outcome of the workshop was discussed on several occasions among the partners, notably at a seminar in Bologna (June 2022) and one in Buenos Aires (March 2023).

The partners worked completely independently and adopted different methodologies to address the discussion on specific historical periods, while also independently managing the technical aspects of podcast production.

In particular, SPEME members had the opportunity to compare their choices with those of others on two occasions: in Bologna in June 2022 and in Buenos Aires in March 2023. In these meetings, the partners discussed the methodologies and practices implemented to disseminate content and optimise results precisely through dialogue.
